The conception of the laser traces back to a theory proposed by Albert Einstein in 1917.

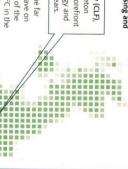

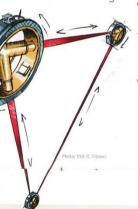

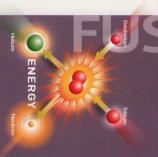
