NORMAN'S SILICON SUCCESS ▶

Christmas shopping presented no problems for Norman Crick (right), an HSO in HARWELL'S Materials Physics and Metallurgy Division. On 12 December, Division Head Dr. Tony Hughes (left) presented him with a cheque for £600, a double award (2×£300) from the HARWELL/Culham Non-Industrial Suggestions Committee. Norman is a member of the team whose work on the member of the team whose work on the neutron of irradiation of silicon for the world's semi-conductor industry earns HARWELL more than £1 million annually.

The very pure silicon (shown in the foreground) needs to be 'doped' with another element to convert it into a semi-conductor. For some 10 years HARWELL has been irradiating these cylinders in DIDO and PLUTO. In the reactor some of the ³⁰Si atoms take up a neutron to ³¹S which decays quickly to ³¹P and provides a very uniform doping.

Norman's first suggestion concerned the improved design of the graphite sleeve surrounding the 3" diameter silicon rods in the 5" diameter reactor hole. This keeps the silicon cool and ensures the best possible quality of the product. The second suggestion was for an improved procedure for the irradiation so as to ensure best use of reactor time.

Slices of silicon doped in this way will be used as diodes in the conversion of Alternating Current to Direct Current and back to Alternating Current in the cable which will carry electricity from France to Britain (or reverse) at peak demand times.

Financial Corner

SHARE PRICES, as measured by the FT index in Britain and the Dow Jones index in the USA, reached record levels in December. But a declaration by the Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) to defend its share of the oil market caused a temporary fall in oil price from \$28 to \$20 per barrel. This caused the exchange rate to drop from \$1.49 to almost £1.40 to the £, and a dip in UK share prices. And why should this concern you? Each \$ fall in oil prices costs the British Government £500M per annum in lost revenue. But since oil is priced in dollars, each 1% fall in the exchange rate is a saving of £150M/year. The net effect is that interest rates (including those on mortgages) are unlikely to diminish in the near future and the possibility of a real income tax cut in the 1986 budget is diminishing.

Savers should take advantage of high interest rates. For non-taxpayers (e.g. children) this is still 11.5% on National Savings Investment Accounts; for standard rate tax payers it is 9.5% (or more) net, on a Building Society instant access account; for higher-rate tax payers it is 8.5% (net) common extension rate paid on National Savings Certificates.

Free-if-in-credit banking for all (but not for Lloyds Bank customers until March) may seem a £9 per annum bonus for many current account holders, but beware of the snags. When £100 was the minimum for free banking, an unexpected debit could result in some charges. But if you now drop below 1p, not only will your charges per item be greater, but you may have a 'failed transaction' charge of £5 (this also applies to Giro accounts) and you will be charged interest on your overdraft (up to 30% APR). So it pays handsomely to maintain your current account in credit by keeping careful records of transactions.

Married Couples who each bought 400 British Telecom Shares and have each received two £18 telephone vouchers may have difficulty in using them by 25 April 1986. Special arrangements have been made for such customers to have an interim bill in advance. Telephone LINKLINE 0345 010505 (local call charge) for details.

TALE OF A COMET

Halley's Comet is becoming more active as it approaches the sun. It has now sprouted a tail some six million miles long - as shown in the photograph (courtesy of Royal Observatory, Edinburgh), taken using the UK Schmidt Telescope in Australia on 9 December. For the experts, the tail is over four degrees long – eight times the apparent diameter of the Moon. Because the telescope was tracking the moving comet during the 25 minute exposure, the star images are somewhat elongated.

For those living in Britain, the 1985/86 visit of Halley's Comet has been something of a disappointment, although some enthusiastic amateur astronomers have obtained photographs using their telescopes and others, using binoculars, have claimed a sighting during December. But this month the Comet is very low on the South West horizon and only visible just after sunset, when atmospheric conditions are good.

For your last 'chance in a lifetime' to see Halley's Comet from Britain, you should look to the South West, where the sun has set. There you will see Jupiter, the brightest object in that part of the sky. Look a few Moon-diameters above Jupiter, and you may see the faint fuzzy patch that is the Comet. But you have to be in the country and away from the glare produced by street

To see the comet at its best, you will have to travel to the Southern Hemisphere in April, after it has emerged from behind the Sun. A special flight on Concorde is being arranged leaving London Heathrow on Saturday, 5 April. A flight to New Zealand has been timed to afford a clear and unobstructed view of Hallay's Comet for acquired 4 hours view of Halley's Comet for around 4 hours during the journey at 59,000 ft. between Singapore and Melbourne. And there's more! On arrival at Auckland there is an exciting programme including a Memorial Ball and further viewing of the Comet from South Lebad. At the end of two glorious South Island. At the end of two glorious weeks, Concorde will return you supersonically to London. And the cost? – a mere £7,000 for this 'trip of a lifetime'.

Edmond Halley made astronomical observations from his private observatory in London in 1682. Previous to that he was a student in The Queen's College, Oxford and subsequently returned as Savilian Professor of Geometry from 1703 to 1720. His private observatory is still visible above the house he occupied - 7 New College Lane, Oxford. He subsequently became Astronomer Royal.
