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CHEMICAL SAFETY EXPERTS MEET

A three-day meeting of world experts on the health aspects of chemical accidents was held at Harwell's Training Centre, hosted by Bob Cumberland, Manager of AEA environment and Energy's National Chemical Emergency Centre (NCEC).

Supported by the UK's Department of Health, delegates from the international Program on Chemical Safety (IPCS), World Health Organisation (WHO), Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) and the United

Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) met to prepare guidelines on the health aspects of chemical accidents.

The National Chemical Emergency Centre is also extending its international involvement by providing training for staff from overseas emergency response centres. Recently Dr Rain Hanaaly from the Indonesian Ministry of Health, and Mariano Goelli of the Argentine CiOUIME have spent time at the Centre developing their expertise in emergency response procedures.

By the end of this year, under new EC legislation, all personal protective equipment such as respirators, gloves, goggles and safety shoes will be required to show a CE mark.

The CE mark will signify that the equipment has passed certain minimum standard criteria set down in European standards, and play a similar role to the British Standard Kite mark.

In order to aquire this mark, equipment mustbe tested at an accredited laboratory, such as Harwell. The new Harwell Respirator Test Facility, part of AEA Environment & Energy, is equipped to carry out the necessary tests which are assessed by a certification body before assessed by a certification body before the equipment can be sold for use in the European Community.
