Even small changes can enhance the environment for wildlife. When groundstaff pollarded a clump of 25 year old poplars near B344, rather than tidy away the off-cuts, they left the 12 ft long logs in a stack and scattered wood chippings around. An ideal habitat was created for insects, which will in turn feed birds.
