SPORTS DAY RESULTS

Cricket Having won the Cricket Cap SIX times out of eight the RL team, winners in 1973 & 1974, were confident of getting a hat trick for the first time. This confidence was almost shattered in their first round match against London Office, which the RL team won by a very narrow margin.

The competition as a whole was a great success, the excellent weather and a 16 overs

success, the excellent weather and a 16 overs per innings limit producing a feast of runs; the largest Sports Day total to date. Quite a number of wickets also fell during the day!

thing, the scores being LO 65 for 7 with Steve Hancock taking 3 wickets for 10 runs, and RL, 68 for 5 aided by John Craig's 24 runs.

The draw for the semi finals produced an interesting situation with Daresbury v RGO and the RL v Appleton. The record book shows that the Rutherford cricketers had reached the final in 6 of the 7 competitions. In these six finals they had only been beaten once and this was by Daresbury in 1970. The only occasion they missed out was in 1973, the finalist that year being RGO & Appleton with RGO taking the cup.

Of the four possible combination for the Of the four possible combination for the final, one alone stood out - the chance to meet Daresbury, the only team to have beaten the RL in a final. This meant that Daresbury had to beat RGO which this they did by 96 runs to 92 and the RL had to dispose of Appleton. They did this in a very convincing style by scoring 77 runs for 2 wickets in 10 overs against Appleton's 76 for 7. Ray Smith, the RL captain contributed 50 not out. The RL having recovered from the early shock of a near defeat went into the final with their tails up. tails up.

This was the match of the day, with batsmen running riot. Daresbury toted up 104 for 4, a very respectable rate, not good enough however to win as the RL batsmen enough however to win as the RL batsmen punished the Daresbury bowlers to the tune of 136 for 2. The outstanding performers were Eddie Smith 35 and Ray Smith 70 not out. Ray scored 131 runs during the day with only one dismissal, a Captains innings by any standard. Where were those England selectors!
